Clarenceville FMC: The history of this English speaking church stems from the beginning of the last century, as a result of the Burlington (Vermont) FMC outreach to Canada. Recently, under the leadership of Pastor Normand and Chantal, the Clarenceville church has started to grow in a tremendous and stable way. On an average Sunday morning service, there are 52 people present for worship

Église Méthodiste Libre de St-Henri, Montréal: This is a multicultural church that started in 1984. Now the average attendance for Sunday morning is about 25 people. The St-Henri church facilities were renovated and upgraded recently and are ready to accommodate the different ministries we are developing.

Église Méthodiste Libre de Sherbrooke: This church plant, pastored by Mozaly Jonas, is 4 years old and is made up mostly of people from the Congo. Last year, through the help of the Ministry Centre, the FMC of Quebec was able to get a mortgage and purchase a commercial building which is now hosting this growing congregation. On an average Sunday morning, there are 68 people present for worship.

Source d'Eau Vive church plant, Sherbrooke: This church is now 17 months old and is pastored by Pierre Sanambe. It is made up primarily of Central Africans from Burundi but it has a vision of reaching out to other African people, Haitians and Quebecois. It meets in a small rented storefront and on a usual Sunday morning, 38 people gather for worship.

Église Internationale Méthodiste Libre de Montréal "Le Refuge": This church plant, pastored by Jean Mbailoulou, is one year old and for now it is mainly made up of Chadian

people. It is located in a multicultural area of St-Laurent and its vision is to reach out to all people in St-Laurent. Église "Le Refuge" started its ministry in the livingroom of one of the church members. Their church service is on Sunday afternoon and usually 15 people meet together for worship.

Église Évangélique Vision de la Lumière, Montréal: Raynal Jean Charles has been pastoring this church plant since March 2006 and it is the fruit of hard work in reaching out within the area of St-Michel, Montréal North, where it is located. On a usual Sunday morning, 55 people meet together for worship. The church is currently made up mainly of Haitians, but their vision is to reach out to other people living in the St-Michel area, including the Quebecois.

Église Méthodiste Libre de Le Gardeur, Repentigny. This church plant, pastored by Pierre Déry, is almost 5 months old and is made up of Haitians and some Quebecois. On an average Sunday morning, there are about 20 people present for worship. Pierre is also busy initiating a Home Cell for the Quebecois in St-Thomas à Lavaltrie.

Église Méthodiste Libre "La Lumière," Gatineau: Isaac Nizigama started this church plant 5 months ago and it is made up of Central Africans from Burundi and Congo. But he has a big vision for the Gatineau area, "In 10 years this church will count hundreds of people from all the cultural backgrounds of Gatineau and surrounding area." Now they meet in a well located storefront and in the Sunday morning service, they count an average of 35 people.

The Open Door Community Church, Montreal: This emerging and post-modern church plant, initiated and pastored by Kim Reid, is 3 years old and is primarily made up of English speaking Quebecois.
